




The original "Flying Aces Trail Blazer of the Air", Major Hank Struck.




The Udet Type U-10 won First Prize in Group B.




#The Darmstadt "Mohamet" with Blackbourne engine.




Three-view outline drawings of the Cunningham-Hall biplane





The Udet Flamingo, a German plane designed for stunting, is powered with a Model 7 Siemens engine.




* Potez 36 folding wing cabin plane

















Scale drawings showing the outlines of the new Junkers light plane


ANOTHER BUGATTI JOB.

















Caudron C-190 with in-line engine




BIG OHIO MEET.






THE FLYING ACES "SWOOSE"

Right from the pages of the old Flying Aces mag comes this nifty low wing ozone chewer that has been reduced in size from the original to have it almost fit Embryo Endurance rules. We say almost because the fuselage width must be increased 1/8 of an inch to come up to the requirements for this division of FAC aero artistry.

A couple of the old timers here at Hangar # 1 cut their modeling teeth on the full sized version of this buzzard and can well remember the thermal cruising qualities she showed. The ship as originaly published in good old F.A. spanned 25 inches, so use that as a guide in any prop calculations you might want to mull over, as well as wood sizes. Perhaps you might want to skip every other wing rib, or something. Give it your personal touch, fellas, and we think this li'l crate will reward you with the sweet taste of victory. FAC style.








Lives there a modeler with soul so dead who never to himself hath said, "Boy, I'ld like to walk right down inside there and look around."
