

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

The Learoyd rules were tried out recently at Glastonbury High gym where no less than 23 ships were entered. Another set of judges used the Mooney system concurrently. The results were varied and interesting.

The Learoyd rules eliminate no type of model or aircraft type from competition.

There is no weight rule, and a minimum of that evil (to Peanuts, at least), documentation.






Pres Bruning of the Detroiten Geschwader. Do you longeron layers recall the neat 3-view of the Tachikawa Trainer in our Aisian


Issue? Well fellas, Pres fell in love with the oriental temptress.








With the Model Builders





Here is another shot of Pres Bruning's nifty Nip that is featured in this issue's Model Lab. She sports all the detail of a ship twice her size.







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


Fig. 5 "Pixie IIIa" two-seat light airplane
