




Flying Aces Model Laboratory

Double barreled delights this time fellows as aero designers Hank O'Dwyer and Dave Stott present their offerings to modeldom. Hank's cute little Fairchild 24 will have a lot of us headin' for the balsa stripper to trim down some lumber to Peanut dimensions. Ah, 'tis a foin job he's up and done, wouldn't ye say? Sure, and it would look saintly with an emerald green fuselage and fin with pure white stab and wings! Jist keep that orange right there in the bottle! We'll have none o' that on this foin machine!


Before presenting the next model in this issue we want to remind our FACs that if you have a model that you would like to see more of why not do what our past daredevil designers have done? Send in a copy of the plan of your crate to GHQ so as we can print 'er up in a future issue of the News. Even original plans will be carefully guarded and returned after printing. The plan need not be as complete as if it were to be used in the "Big" mags, and photos of a completed model are not neccessary. Detailed descriptions need not be sent either, as most modelers give their own treatment to all models they build anyhow.

Next on the deadline is "Angular" Adolph Rohrbach's "Roland" airliner. "Achtung, achtung," blares the loudspeaker at Templehof. "All passenger for Munich und Augsburg board liner number seeben." Yep fellows, this box was one of Lufthansa's early beer and sausage earners. Here is

your chance to earn greater rewards in FAC competition!
Look at the bonus points those trimotors win you!
But look at the -5 for the high wing cabin configuration! Oh well, it is a nice crate



anyhow! Why not try one. Here's a few tips to help you interpret the plans......

Fuselage sides are 1/32 sheet balsa with 1/16 stiffeners glued to the inside surfaces at sections X-X. Section A-A at the nose gets 1/16X1/8 stiffeners. Cabin windows are pre-cut out in the 1/32 sheet sides and top. Once sides are joined in usual fashion, 1/32 sheet is laid on top and bottom and trimmed off even with sides. Pilot's cabin frame is built up of 1/32 squares. All celluloid is attached inside the fuselage. Not easy, but rewarding in appearance. Nose from A-A forward is carved from solid balsa and hollowed out. A small nose plug was fitted on the original model and the entire engine cowl from A-A forward was removable to facilitate winding. Thrust line adjustments were made by shimming the nose button.



Engine nacels are solid and hollowed from b-b forward. Aft of this they are made of 1/32 sheet sides with soft 1/8 sheet bottom sanded to shape.

Radiators were built up of 1/32 sht. outline with a railroad stock bass wood "clapboard" stock cut to fit in front to represent shutters.


L.G. "V" is music wire covered with black insulation stripped from electrical wire. Girthy oleo balsa strut is slotted to allow wire struts to flex.


Lift wire is strip of bamboo. The remainder of the structure is standard proceedure.


Perhaps better performance might be gained by reducing the thickness of the airfoil a bit. Although the one shown on the plan is very close to scale, a thinner one, if not carried to extremes, would not mar the appearence. Performance of the F.A. test lab model was mediocre, although an eye pleaser.

Color scheme is all over silver with black engine cowls, struts, and radiator shells. Radiator shutters were silver. "ROHRBACH ROLAND" is also black as would be the German civil registration if it were known. Photos seen for reference were works photos and no registry was allotted at that time.

One truly comforting feature is the resistance to damage due to blown motors with this baby!

is well suited to this type of model activity



"The Thompson Trophy went to Jim Hyka flying an excellent Gee Bee "D" Sportster. Highest single flight was only 30 secs; but the FAC rules did their equalizing thing and beat Mike Midkiff's Mr. Mulligan by ONE



1. Your name and rank.
2. Name of your Peanut model.
3. The date of your flight.

4. The time of your flight.
5. The "Wing" you competed The "Wing" you competed in. (Indoor or Outdoor)

You can fly as often as you want and send in as many cards as you want as long as your latest flight time exceeded your last. The Clubster who is leading with highest flight time in his Wing will be "Wing Commander" of that Wing. Whoever remains commander of each Wing at the close of the contest is the winner!


